Some of the kings of Israel tried to avoid paying tribute to us. We had enough of this and in 722 B.C. Assyria conquered Israel and deported the people, leading them off to Assyria with fish hooks in their noses and lips.

The ten northern tribes that made up Israel became mixed breeds with Assyrians and people from bordering countries. Eventually, the old kingdom of Israel became

known as Samaría. The people of Samaría were despised by the Jews.

This section of the Black Obelisk shows King Jehu of Israel paying tribute to King Shalmaneser of Assyria. So far, this is the first likeness found of any king of Israel or Judah.
